INTRODUCTION

Sustainability is the preservation of resources to maintain an ecological balance, and is made up of three pillars: the economy, society, and the environment.

Sustainability was the foundation for the United Nations's 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These goals address the many challenges that our global society is facing, including poverty, inequality, climate change, ecological damage, and peace and justice.

Sustainable development focuses on meeting the needs of the population without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs, and the SDGs are a recognition by all nations of the world that ending poverty and other inequalities must be tackled while we also deal with climate change and environmental preservation.

Teaching about both sustainability and sustainable development is important because it gives students the chance to take responsibility for their actions and contribute to the United Nations's ultimate goal of a more sustainable future.

Sustainability is, of course, a key part of learning about sustainable fashion. Additionally, the fashion industry is a part of many different Sustainable Development Goals.

LESSON PLANS

TEACHING SUSTAINABILITY

Teach For America provides lesson plan ideas for students in grades Pre-K-2, 3-5, 6-8, and 9-12. While students in grade 2 will learn about why trees are important for people and where water goes when it "goes" away after a storm, students in grade 9 will learn about how pollution can be regulated to promote environmental justice!

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

The United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) provides resources for educators directly related to each of the seventeen sustainable development goals. For example, for SDG-1, an explanation of why education is crucial to achieving no poverty is included and multimedia educational resources, ideas for classroom activities, and pedagogical resources are offered for early childhood care and education, primary education, and secondary education.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT FROM AN EARLY AGE

The United Nations has a collection of student resources for learning about sustainable development. These resources include Thomas & Friends Life Lessons, Climate Action Superhero missions, the trivia game Freerice from WFP, and more. Educators who are looking to find a way for their students to learn about sustainability in a fun and engaging way should take a look!

<u>SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS</u>

Arizona State University (ASU) offers teacher resources for grades 6-9 that cover a variety of topics, including food systems sustainability, quality of life and well-being, decision-making for sustainability, etc. Students may participate in activities, such as mini debates and 1-2-3 presentations, and lessons on defining sustainability measuring their ecological footprint.

LESSON PLANS

10 READY-TO-USE LESSON PLANS

BookWidgets provides 10 interactive and ready-to-use lesson plans on the Sustainable Development Goals. This resource recommends that educators first show students a video on the SDGs and then let students solve a jigsaw puzzle, practice the SDGs with flashcards or a hotspot image, pull the SDGs into a classroom discussion, play an SDG board game either physically or digitally, take a quiz to check their knowledge, and complete an SDG project!

SDG ACADEMY

The SDG Academy has created many free online courses and educational materials on sustainable development and the SDGs. Some of their courses include Work and Employment for a Sustainable Future, Governance for Transboundary Freshwater Security, Climate Change: The Science and Global Impact, and Nature-Based Solutions for Disaster and Climate Resilience.

BECOMING AGENTS FOR CHANGE

PBS NewsHour has put together a lesson plan on becoming agents for change through the Sustainable Development Goals. The lesson asks students to watch two videos, one in which they will explore each of the SDGs and another where they will learn about how failing infrastructure and climate change leaves many South Africans without water and then identify which SDGs apply to the story. After sharing in small groups and having a class discussion, they will read the article *America's Clean Water Crisis Goes Far Beyond Flint. There's No Relief in Sight*, participate in another class discussion, and re-examine the SDGs.

ARTICLES

FOUR REASONS TO TEACH THE GOALS

Participate Learning offers an article on their blog that discusses four reasons to teach the Sustainable Development Goals. The article explains how students should learn about the SDGs because they need to learn about the world, be active participants in the world they live in, grow empathy and compassion, and be inspired to take action!

GOALS FOR AND WITH CHILDREN

UNICEF provides an article discussing how we can achieve the Sustainable Development Goals for and with children. The organization supports a "3As" approach: raising awareness, taking action, and holding decision makers accountable for progress. Therefore, the article describes each of these steps in detail and provides resources to help students and educators alike achieve them!

WHAT DOES "NO ONE LEFT BEHIND" MEAN?

The United Nations Foundation has published an article in which the author asks Mara van Loggerenber, the UN Foundation's Senior Manager of Policy Initiatives, for answers to the most common questions on the Sustainable Development Goals. Mara van Loggerenberg explains what "no one left behind" means in context of the SDGs, why the emphasis on leaving no one behind is significant, what success looks like, what some steps are that the international community needs to take to make sure no one is left behind, and more related topics.

UN CURRENT NEWS ON GOALS

UN News offers a collection of global perspective human stories related to the SDGs. Topics of articles include desertification and drought destabilizing the well-being of 3.2 billion people; the Covid crisis pushing global unemployment over 200 million mark in 2022; and the UN chief calling for a global partnership to address Covid, climate change, and to achieve the SDGs.

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ARTICLES

TEACHING SUSTAINABILITY

Vanderbilt University provides an article on teaching sustainability. The concepts focused on in this article include what sustainability is, tips for teaching sustainability, its interdisciplinary nature, teaching with place-based and project-based learning, and teaching with ecological footprints. For educators who are continuing to seek sustainability resources after finishing the article, there are Vanderbilt and local resources at the end of the article, including organizations and journals, books, blogs and podcasts, and more.

WOMEN AND THE SDGS

In addition, there is a video near the end of the article that explains the facts about gender equality and the SDGs.

INTRODUCTION

Fast fashion refers to "an approach to the design, creation, and marketing of clothing fashions that emphasizes making fashion trends quickly and cheaply available to consumers" (Merriam-Webster).

The environmental impacts of fast fashion are vast and include the depletion of non-renewable resources, the use of significant amounts of water and energy, and the emission of greenhouse gases. In fact, according to Business Insider, fast fashion production is responsible for 10% of the total global carbon emissions. Therefore, in recent years, there has been a call for fashion to become more sustainable.

Sustainable fashion takes environmental and socioeconomic factors into consideration when clothing, shoes, and accessories are manufactured. Teaching students about fast fashion and sustainable production is important because they will be able to make a conscious decision to invest in a sustainable wardrobe to contribute to the ultimate goal of a more sustainable future for us all!

This section is especially applicable when talking about social media, as the continuous rotation of trends has greatly contributed to the fast fashion industry.

LESSON PLANS

GET REDRESSED

Redress is an environmental charity with a mission to prevent and transform textile waste in the fashion industry. Redress put together a lesson plan to introduce students to the issue of textile waste; encourage them to reflect on their own fashion consumption, clothing use, and disposal habits; and provide them with the knowledge and tools to take action. This lesson focuses on the polluting effects of clothes and possible solutions but will also support teachers who are teaching their students about the UN Sustainable Development Goals, specifically Goal 12 of Responsible Production and Consumption.

RETHINKING FAST FASHION AFTER BANGLADESH

PBS LearningMedia offers an audio recording of an essay from Youth Radio where a teenager reflects on her buying and shopping habits. After touring Bangladesh and hearing stories about the local factory conditions, she returns to the United States determined not to buy clothes made in sweatshops along with raising awareness about fast fashion. This essay and its accompanying activity will help teachers start a discussion with students about consumerism and challenge them to research where their clothing came from and what living and working conditions are like in that country. For those who want to teach their students about the implications fast fashion has on the livelihoods of people in other countries, this lesson should be helpful!

CAN FAST FASHION BE SUSTAINABLE?


PUTTING THE BRAKES ON FAST FASHION

CHILD LABOR

INTRODUCTION

Child labor is defined as the "use of children in industry or business, especially when illegal or considered inhumane" (Oxford Dictionary). This term refers to work that interferes with a child's ability to learn, endangering them emotionally and/or physically.

Though there are laws on child labor in the United States and several other countries, child labor still exists and is especially prevalent in developing nations.

In learning about child labor, students will also learn how they can spread awareness and fight against it.

Child labor is, unfortunately, common in the fashion industry. This makes it an important topic to talk about when talking about the social impacts of the industry.

CHILD LABOR

LESSON PLANS

WHAT IS CHILD LABOR?

TeacherVision has put together a lesson plan which teaches students about child labor and encourages them to take action. With this lesson, classes will first discuss the International Labor Organization's definition of child labor, learn about the types of jobs children have historically performed, and finally, complete a project related to combatting child labor and spreading the word about its injustices.

GIVING A VOICE TO CHILD LABORERS


ReadWriteThink offers a lesson on giving a voice to child laborers, which includes a preview, standards, resources and preparation, an instructional plan, and related resources. Through multiple sessions, students will be asked to write a monologue from the viewpoint of factory reformers, supporters of child labor, and factory workers during the Industrial Revolution. By the time students have finished the last session, they will have learned about child labor in the past and present!

CHILD LABOR AND THE BUILDING OF AMERICA

The Library of Congress provides a lesson overview, preparation, procedure, and evaluation on child labor in the United States. The lesson itself contains an introduction and background on child labor, a primary source analysis of documents and photographs, a guided practice, and a student project. Students will gain a deeper understanding of child labor after the Industrial Revolution, during the Progressive Era, and in modern-day societies around the world.

LAWS, DEFINITIONS, & INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION

HISTORY offers valuable information on child labor, including child labor in the United States, the Industrial Revolution, immigration and child labor, child labor reform, the Great Depression, automatization and education, and child labor today. Additionally, it includes a collection of photos, which will help students understand how apalling and horrifying child labor truly is.

TAKE ACTION IN FASHION

INTRODUCTION

In recent years, we have begun to recognize the importance of conserving and preserving our environment for future generations. Conservation is the care and protection of the earth so it can persist for future generations through using natural resources responsibly. Though the word "conservation" is used interchangeably with "preservation" by many, preservation attempts to keep the earth safe through protecting the environment from harmful human activities.

By teaching about environmental conservation and preservation, educators will give students the opportunity to learn about the two different approaches to keeping our planet safe and the importance of protecting our earth which will ideally help them become more engaged outside the classroom regarding confronting environmental issues!

Fashion is one of the highest polluting industries, contributing greatly to carbon emissions and polluting our waterways. Controlling overconsumption in the fashion industry is key to environmental conservation and preservation.

LESSON PLANS

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) offers lesson plans and corresponding activity sheets for educators teaching students in grades PreK-3, 3-6, and 6-12. The collections of resources cover various topics under the umbrella of environmental education. For students in grades 3-6 and 6-12, there are three lesson plans on recycling and conservation. These lessons include an aluminum can challenge, a word search, and a lesson that focuses on where garbage goes and the reduction of the waste stream.

PRESERVATION IN THE PROGRESSIVE ERA

PBS LearningMedia provides a teaching guide on exploring environmental preservation in the Progressive Era. This teaching guide offers educators a specific primary source set and corresponding discussion questions, classroom activities, and primary source analysis tools. For educators who are interested in teaching their class about how events, such as American industrialization and the expansion of railroads, during the Progressive Era led to increased pollution and environmental destruction and spurred environmental moments calling for either conservation or preservation, this resource will be extremely helpful!

ENVIRONMENT AND CONSERVATION LESSONS

Share My Lesson has put together a collection of environment and conservation lessons and activities for students at the high school level. Some examples of topics covered in these resources include the 6Rs of sustainability, natural hazards, the Haiti earthquake, and energy use. To access any of these lessons, educators will only have to make a free account for the website.

LESSON PLANS

FILM MODULES & CURRICULUM

PBS LearningMedia has put together a collection of activities and supporting video modules that encourage students to examine the key social and political issues impacting women around the world. Students will explore the topics of social change and social justice, equal rights, and civic engagement. They will also learn about international struggles and understand better how to take an active role in issues affecting their own local communities.

GIRLS EQUITY & EMPOWERMENT

The Making Caring Common Project from Harvard Graduate School of Education provides a compilation of websites that offer useful programs, research, resources, and/or activities to promote girls' and women's equity and empowerment. Accompanying each website is an explanation of its contents. The programs and resources listed include the Geena Davis Institute, Girls Inc., Girls Leadership, Girls Write Now, and many more!

EMPOWERING WOMEN: EMPOWERING CHILDREN

UNICEF provides a middle and high school unit introducing gender equality with a focus on empowering women and children. This lesson includes the opening activity What Do You Know About Women In The World?, video Gender Equality Can Help Children, a discussion to help students make connections, and a final homework assignment. In the lesson, students will become familiar with the terms "gender equality" and "gender inequality," understand the basic facts about gender inequalities worldwide, and ultimately identify main ideas about gender equality in a video.

ARTICLES

EMPOWER & CELEBRATE WOMEN - SDG 5

Participate Learning provides an article explaining four ways to empower and celebrate women in the classroom using Sustainable Development Goal #5: achieve gender equality and empower all women and goals. The article suggests teachers share positive stories of influential women through history curriculum, promote gender expression in the classroom, incorporate books into class written about women by women, and encourage students to share personal experiences about women who have inspired them. UNEMPLOYMENT & LACK OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

TAKE ACTION IN FASHION

INTRODUCTION

Unemployment and lack of economic opportunity have always been present, but the recent pandemic has exacerbated inequalities and brought these issues to the forefront.

Both issues have a significant impact on individuals, families, communities, and the nation as a whole. However, unemployment and economic opportunity are unequally distributed and affect minority groups more heavily than others.

Teaching about unemployment and lack of economic opportunity is important because students should be given the opportunity to learn about issues that plague their communities so that they can ideally advocate for change.

The lack of economic opportunities has resulted in people accepting jobs with low wages and unsafe working conditions. This is common in the fashion industry and contributes greatly to the need for sustainable reform.

LESSON PLANS

UNEQUAL UNEMPLOYMENT

Teaching Tolerance provides a lesson on unequal unemployment which will have students analyze and interpret unemployment rates across different states and three racial groups, including Hispanics, African Amerians, and whites. For educators teaching in middle or high school classrooms, it would be beneficial to share this article with students because the opinions come from their peers and all the information is tailored to their age group!

This News Release from the United States Department of Labor includes the most updated statistics and data on employment in the United States. These trends can be used to help explain our economy as well as unemployment and lack of economic opportunities.

RACIAL AND REGIONAL INEQUALITY

Brookings offers an article on how racial and regional inequality affect economic opportunity. The article talks about how many African Americans live in low-income communities that do not provide them with the opportunity to advance themselves economically due to U.S. policies. Two maps, a Hamilton Project paper, and recent research are referenced while the author discusses the regional concentration of the African American population, economic mobility, and the connection of racial and regional inequality.

CONCLUSION

Teaching about unemployment and lack of economic opportunity may be difficult because they are sensitive topics depending on if students have personal experience with them. Educators should be sure to have a discussion with students and remind them that they can opt out of any activities that make them feel uncomfortable. On that note, educators should also tailor lessons to the needs of their students and classrooms if they are aware of any connection they may have to the topic. However, the lesson plans, articles, informational sites, and multimedia resources above should be relatively careful and thoughtful but also informative in the way these topics are explained.

TAKE ACTION IN FASHION

INTRODUCTION

Environmental justice is "the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income, with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies" (EPA).

Unfortunately, in the U.S., low-income and colored communities are disproportionately affected by environmental issues, including air pollution and climate change. The ultimate goal of environmental justice is to ensure that all people are fairly and equally affected by environmental policies.

Teaching about environmental justice is important because in order to become informed citizens who take actions against inequalities in our society, students need to learn about how environmental issues negatively affect certain communities.

Different populations are affected disproportionately by the environmental impacts of the fashion industry, making environmental justice key in these conversations.

LESSON PLANS

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE & SUSTAINABILITY
